Because literacy depends on good vision or the ability to read Braille, this newest service program is intrinsically linked to our signature initiatives: sight preservation and service to the blind. We renew our commitment to sight yearly with [World Sight Day](#) and the [Sharing the Vision](#) Global Service Action Campaign, scheduled this year for October. Now is the time to plan your club or district's participation in this worldwide effort of all Lions. Please see [Sharing the Vision](#) for [project ideas](#) and other resources.

Reaching into new frontiers like literacy is one way that Lions are expanding our worldwide impact. Another crucial way is by establishing new clubs to bring Lions service to communities where it is needed and by increasing club membership to provide more and better service in those communities we now serve. Please work closely with [GLT](#) and [GMT](#) representatives in your area to make this happen.

Improving the health of young people is an important role of our Foundation. One way that you can do that through LCIF is by supporting the [One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative](#). 

Lion Anthony Cheung Ph.D.

Anthony was born in Hong Kong. He migrated and settled in Sydney in 1988.

Anthony went to school in Hong Kong and then onto university where he earned his Master of Education and Master of Arts degrees prior to his Ph.D. in Applied Linguistics from Nottingham University. He was elected a Fellow of the Institute of Linguists, UK in 1988.

Anthony has been a language educator for a good part of his career. He has over 35 years' experience in the design, management & implementation of English language programs at the secondary and tertiary levels. Between 1990 and 2007, he worked as a Coordinator at the Institute of Languages, University of NSW. He was appointed Acting Head of different Departments on many occasions.

Anthony has accumulated a respectable list of published conference papers and is the author of books entitled *Writing Business Reports* and *Writing Business Letters* which are published in Australia & China. He has taken part in consultancy work across a range of businesses.

One of his recent achievements is successfully brokering a Friendship Cities alliance between Hornsby Shire and the City of Xian, China.

Anthony met his wife, Emma, in Hong Kong in 1980. Emma was then a high school English and History teacher. They were married in 1981 and moved to Sydney in 1988. They have a daughter, Janice, a practising optometrist, who is also a Lion currently serving as Secretary at Sydney Chinese.

Anthony enjoys singing. Being a church choir member at 16 and a high school choir conductor at 21 contribute much to his current profile.

Under Lion Anthony's stewardship, our club has initiated Humanitarian scholarships, Teal Ribbon scholars schemes, traditional Chinese medicine post-graduate research scholarships (with University of Technology and Science), visitations to the elderly, etc, resulting in excellent media coverage for both Lions and our club.

Our monthly bulletins have repeatedly won District awards, including the prestigious Ted Tricker Memorial Bulletin Award in 2010. In the 2009-10 Lions Year, our bulletin and website both won an Honorable Mention (Runner-up) at the LCI International Contest whilst Lion Anthony was Chief Editor.

Lion May Wong

Lion May is expected to become a qualified medical doctor when she graduates from her course, Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery at the end of this year from the University of New South Wales. Following the footsteps of her parents, Lion May is the daughter of two family doctors who migrated from Hong Kong in the 1980s. They are heavily involved in maintaining the health of the elderly Chinese Australian population in the Inner West Region. As a result, she has applied the same mantra and beliefs, being actively involved in health promotion amongst the community.

In 2006-2007, Lion May instituted a number of English as a Second Language for Migrants classes organised by CSSS, a project which provided free English classes for children who had recently migrated to Australia. She found this a rewarding experience to witness their progression from having a vocabulary of just a few English words, to engaging in a comprehensible dialogue with others. From 2007 onwards, she shifted her focus towards medical efforts in concordance with the completion of her degree in Medicine. In 2009, she travelled overseas and hosted a Toys Fair Day for children with Multiple Sclerosis and raised HK\$15,000 while acting as Expo Ambassador for the Hong Kong Social Welfare Department.

On an academic platform, Lion May was the DUX of her high school and received a University Admissions Index of 100 in 2006. She has also embarked on scientific research whilst pursuing her medical degree, guided by some of the NSW's most highly

regarded researchers.

In 2010, she completed a one-year research project in the Surgical and Orthopedics laboratory at the Prince of Wales Hospital. Lion May subsequently presented her results internationally at the Australian and New Zealand Orthopedics Conference and to her peers at the inaugural Australian Surgical Students Conference. She continued this strong interest in research and was selected as the Multiple Sclerosis Vacation Scholar. Here, she studied the effects of microglia in demyelinating disorders. Furthermore, she has published several articles as the primary author in international and national journals.

In 2011, she pursued her elective at Queen Mary Hospital in Hong Kong where she conducted research into Hepatology, as conditions like Hepatitis and Hepatocellular Carcinoma were more prevalent in that locale.

Currently, she is planning to undertake a 2-month research program in renal fibrosis in the coming Australian summer with Kidney Health Australia at the Royal North Shore Hospital.

She has been involved with the Interprofessional Educators program at the South Eastern Sydney Local Health District which involved ward simulation with nurses, physiotherapists and pharmacists. This interest in research and unique involvement with allied health makes her an ideal candidate for the 3-Year Directorship of the Lions Nurses Scholarship Foundation Board.

In her spare time, May enjoys playing badminton. At present, she still dedicates time tutoring migrant students English.
