For the Chinese, 2012 is the year of the Dragon. Of the twelve Chinese zodiac creatures, only the Dragon can bring upon changes. The Dragon, however, does not change into other animals. It effects changes to its environment. It brings and dispatches the wind and clouds; and rain and thunder. The changes it brings can be quick and sudden.

The year of the Dragon is therefore a year of environmental changes and I don't mean global warming. Sixty years ago, in another year of the Dragon, Elizabeth Windsor became Queen as her father had no male heir. This year of the Dragon, Britain has announced a change of her laws that even if the first born of Kate Middleton shall be female, this heir will be first in line in the succession of throne.

The word Changeover suggests total systematic changes. For Lion Clubs, changeovers are more systematic than total. Systematic, in the sense that in many cases the former 1st Vice District Governor becomes the District Governor and so on. Not at all total, in the sense that many office-bearers are re -elected to the same positions so long as the by-laws allow.

All the re-elections comply with the by-laws as there is no mandatory maximum to the number of terms in many cases. The reelections are therefore legal and democratic.

To change or not to change? Alternatively, what to change and what to keep is the question. The answer is simple. We

keep what we are comfortable with and change what need to be changed. With due nomination procedures those who seek re-elections and are not objected to by the other Lions get reelected. The theme of PDG John Harrison --- "Be the change you want to see" carries more or less the same implications. In other words, we change what we want to change and what we need to change.

This year, the major changes in Sydney Chinese Lions are the incorporation of a Membership Chairperson and two Membership Directors. It is crystal clear that "to enthuse existing members, recruit new members" is one of the major directions of Sydney Chinese Lions. Sydney The Club's ambition to grow its member's roll from the current 130 plus to 200 is well set. For a Service Organization whose motto is "We Serve", its achieve-ments and success clearly depend on the number and calibre of its members and their efforts. Of course, we should not forget the importance of direction setting by its leaders and their leadership in following them through.

If this sounds inward looking we observe that Past President Lion Dr Anthony Cheung has now been elected as the 2nd Vice District Governor of Lions District 201 N5. He was inducted at the District Changeover last weekend. Sydney Chinese Lions President Mei Cheng has pledged hers and the full support of her Club for the activities of N5. For instance, the 500 Trees Planting Project had accounted for half of the target of 1,000 pledged by IPDG Stephen Coleman for the District. In the coming years, President Mei's pledge of support for the District will manifest into further "reaching out" to support other Lion Clubs and projects in the District.

I am fully convinced that the changes the year of the Dragon brings to the Sydney Chinese Lions are all for the better.

Global Service Action Campaign

Since their inception in 2010, the <u>Global Service Action Campaigns</u> have touched the lives of more than 36 million people. Keep this positive momentum moving by preparing your clubs and districts for the <u>Engaging Our Youth</u> campaign in August. You can:

- Implement a reading program at a school or library
- Organize a job fair for young people
- Hold a seminar on social media safety

Be sure to document your projects on the <u>Lions Services Activity Report</u> for a chance to be among 10 projects featured weekly in the <u>World of Service Weekly Project Spotlight</u>.

One of my first official acts was to sign <u>an agreement to collaborate</u> with the U.S. Agency for International Development to improve early childhood reading in developing nations. This agreement brings Lions Clubs International into alliance with the <u>All Children Reading</u> initiative established by USAID, the Australian Agency for International Development, World Vision and others to improve the reading skills of 100 million children by 2015. The agreement, signed at the international convention in Busan, the Republic of Korea, ensures that LCI's <u>Reading Action Program</u> and All Children Reading will collaborate effectively in targeted countries.



Our thanks got to Wendy Lin of Sydney Chinese Lions who did an excellent job of arranging accommodation and a tour guide for us. 3 District Governors Elect plus wives, add one Cabinet Secretary (Jennifer) and a female friend of the DGE from the Gold Coast, bonded together in true Lions fashion and had a wonderful exciting time. One thing that fascinates me though is why would a person risk life and limb trying to cross any road in Beijing. We absolutely loved Beijing from the Temples to the Forbidden City to the Great Wall (which I climbed beyond the first tower) and to all of the little back street markets where some of the produce left a little to be desired, but we found the people really warm, friendly and caring.

President Tam was his usual lovable self and delighted to announce that his 1 million tree initiative resulted in over 13 million trees being planted, "WOW". The entertainment during the Convention was absolutely spectacular. Incoming President Wayne Madden and his wife Linda hail from Auburn, Indiana, USA and Wayne's passion is the Indianapolis 500. He managed to get us fully revved up for a great year with his theme of "A World of Service". He also has another passion and that is literacy. One in four people throughout the
