Message from our **LCIF Chairperson**

Dear Lion,

As a parent and grandparent, one area of service that is especially important to me is programs that benefit our youth. Our Foundation offers this service opportunity through Lions Quest. Our kids are learning more than what is printed in a textbook; they are developing vital skills that will fully prepare them for their teen and adult years. I've witnessed the success of this program from my home state of North Carolina, USA, to Thailand.

Lions in these areas and around the world know the value Lions Quest has for kids. It's exciting that this program continues to grow each year, and this is only possible because of you, Lions. Just last month during our Lions Quest Advisory Committee Meeting, we awarded 26 grants for more than US\$1.2 million—a

new record! Three of these grants are for France, the Republic of Georgia and Slovenia to begin the program, bringing the total number of Lions Quest countries to 69.

We are also working with new partners and organizations to help us in our expansion efforts. In August, a training workshop was held for 31 teachers and personnel from Joint Base Lewis McChord, a U.S. military installation in the state of Washington. These educators will use Lions Quest to positively impact the lives of kids whose parents have been repeatedly deployed for active duty. With grant funding from the U.S. State Department, we will adapt Lions Quest materials for use in Africa and expand our programs in five countries. And many Lions have successfully partnered with their local governments and ministries of education. In Lithuania, for example, the Lions received a 500,000 Euro grant from the European Union to expand the program nationwide.

We are eager to work with you, and I encourage you to appoint a Lions Quest chairperson in your district, if you do not have one, to help lead this effort locally. I invite all of you to learn more about this important program during the area Forums, where we will have a Lions Quest seminar or training. If you are unable to attend, all of these materials will be available on our new LCIF Web site.

This time round, instead of picking a local charity as Major Beneficiary, the Board has resolved to support the Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF), our own Lions' foundation which provides emergency relief and humanitarian service worldwide.

Key LCIF personnel will be attending the Ball to support. They are led by LCIF Chairperson Lion Sid L Scruggs III and wife Lion Judy Scruggs. Representing Multiple District 201 will be LCIF Multiple District 201 Coordinator PDG Nigel Jeny and wife Lion Genevieve Jeny. We certainly look forward to welcoming them to our midst next March.

At present, preparations for the Ball is proceeding in earnest. The Ball Steering Committee has met a few times and the Sponsorship Packages have now been finalised. These packages are now published on our club's website at www.sydneychineselions.org.au. To date, a number of long time Sponsors have been approached and their consent to continue with their sponsorships have been sought.

Unfortunately our recent discussions with the Australian International Conservatorium of Music regarding entertainment has not been fruitful. We are now looking for suitable alternatives.

One of our current major tasks is to assemble prizes for the silent auction and raffle. In this regard, we are seeking the support of all members. 

The Lions Club of Sydney Chinese Inc. is a member of Lions Clubs International, an international non profit community service organization, upholding a common motto "WE SERVE". Today, there are Lions clubs in 206 countries and geographical areas all over the world. In District 201N5, which covers the Sydney area and Norfolk Island, there are some 68 clubs with around 1,700 members. Amongst these, there are around 7 Chinese-based clubs. Sydney Chinese Lions is the first of these Chinese-based clubs chartered in April 1995.

Over the past sixteen years, under the leadership of President Mei Cheng, Past President & Zone Chairman Dr Anthony Cheung and other Past Presidents, in conjunction with the relentless effort of its members, and on top of all these, the generous donations and sponsorships received from the community, the club has donated over \$450,000 to a number of charities including the Royal Flying Doctor Service of Australia, St John (NSW), the Australian Red Cross, CareFlight, the Sir David Martin Foundation, the Fred Hollows Foundation, Westmead and Concord Hospitals, the Children's Mobility (Hart Walker) Foundation and the Elderly Australian Chinese Homes. Thousands have reaped the benefits. The club is also mindful of encouraging young adults to participate in humanitarian services, hence, since 2003, it has been offering its humanitarian scholarships. In 2009, they set up the Sydney Chinese Lions Teal Ribbon Scholars Scheme to promote and facilitate experience sharing between medical doctors and medical personnel of the People's Republic of China and Australia.
